ATLANTA

TAKING its name from the Singapore Strait, Straits Atlanta is the epicurean brainchild of the hairstylist-turned-chef Chris Yeo and the Grammy-winning rapper and actor Chris Bridges (best known as Ludacris). The restaurant is also a convergence point for stars and admirers who might otherwise never meet — especially those fans who want to meet Mr. Bridges.

“What’s most important is that when I’m here, I greet people and ask them what they like and dislike,” said Mr. Bridges, speaking from the dual-level eatery. (He owns a stake in the restaurant and the building that houses it.)

“Every time we’ve been here, we’ve seen Ludacris,” said Lynn Lilly, 23, a restaurant marketing coordinator, who was making her seventh visit to Straits Atlanta since its April 25 opening.

Under the neon-blue glow of the bar shelves, she sipped cocktails with Jen Dolny, 23, a friend.

“It’s drawing the top people in the industry,” Ms. Lilly said.

The question is, which industry? On a recent Monday night, patrons ranged from music business veterans to society mavens.

Thomas Schoborg, the executive chef at the nearby Rosa Mex-

icano restaurant, sat several seats away from Corinna Allen, a reporter for CBS in Atlanta; Beth Weitzman, the editor of Jezebel magazine; and Carolyn O’Neil, a former executive producer and senior correspondent at CNN.

Like the clientele of Straits Atlanta, the Singaporean cuisine served here is a hodgepodge, with Chinese, Malay, Indian, Thai and Indonesian influences, though patrons offer other analogies.

“The roti is like crack,” said Camille Wright, 36, the owner of a boutique in nearby Decatur, who was devouring the paper-thin pancakes with friends.

When not posing for admirers wielding camera phones, Mr. Bridges sat at a corner table with Ciara, the R & B singer, and Keshia Knight Pulliam, all grown up since her days playing Rudy, the youngest Huxtable child, on “The Cosby Show.”

The old friends discussed new projects: Ciara — CiCi to her table companions — recently signed with Wilhelmina Models, while Ms. Knight Pulliam will appear in the second season of the TBS comedy “Tyler Perry’s House of Payne.”

Mr. Bridges, who has starred in such films as “Crash” and “Hustle & Flow,” lamented being unable to leave Toronto — even on his days off — while shooting the movie “Max Payne” with Mark Wahlberg.

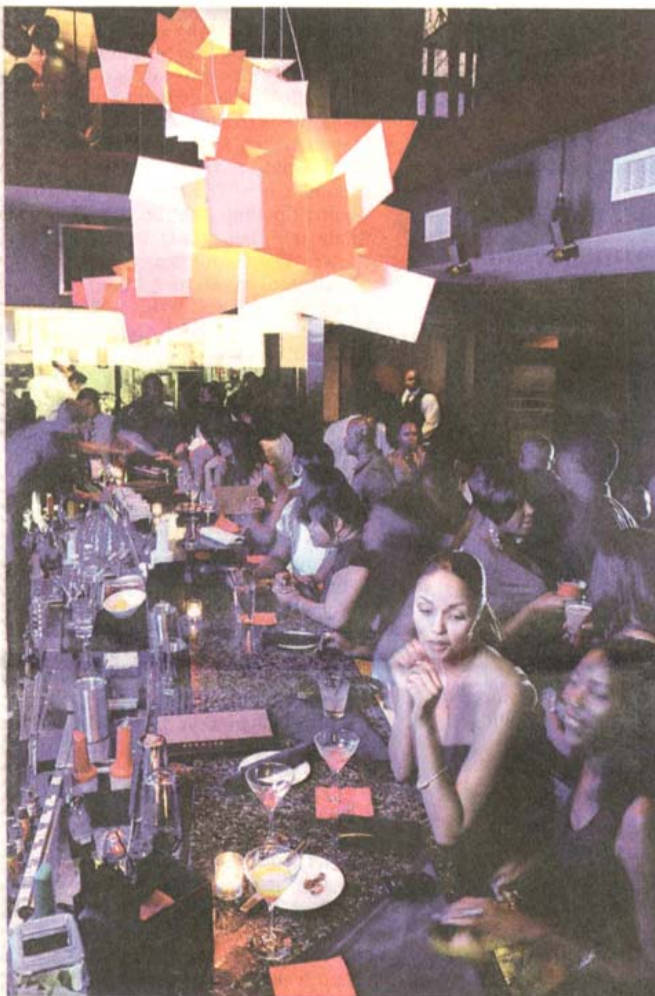
Mr. Bridges’s favorite item on the menu is the chicken lollipops, though it may soon be upstaged by the Billionaire’s Margarita, a \$50 concoction spiked with Partida Blanco Tequila and aged Grand Marnier.

“This is the best margarita I’ve ever had,” he said, commending Ferdinand Garrido, the restaurant’s bartender.
